I am extremely privileged to have the opportunity to welcome you to the 10th annual Youth Leadership Summit for Sustainable Development. I want to extend a special welcome to those who have travelled a great distance to attend this unique event.

You have all expressed different reasons for choosing to attend this Summit. Some of you are here because you are curious about other islands and their ways of life. Some of you are here because you want to protect and preserve the fragile ecosystems of your island. It is our responsibility to leave to future generations the same healthy, vibrant oceans many of us have been fortunate enough to enjoy throughout our lives. We need as many voices as possible in this ongoing discussion, contributing solutions that will make a difference. I support opportunities for your voices to be heard.


