MVYLI's Career Mentoring Program: 2016-2017

The Martha's Vineyard Youth Leadership Initiative expanded its successful Job Shadow Day Program – to a year-round program: MVYLI's Career Mentoring Program. During the last six years, MVYLI has matched over 80 Island businesses and professionals with Vineyard youth. This one-day experience is eye opening and life changing (see MVYLI's Case Study). MVYLI's Mentor Program gives Vineyard youth ongoing mentorship opportunities. MVYLI's team hosts weekly workshops to prepare students to maximize these mentoring experiences. As part of their preparation, youth research potential career pathways aligned with their personal and professional dreams. They develop their first bios and headshots to include in their portfolios. MVYLI's team then matches youth with professionals in the Vineyard community who have jobs/careers in these fields. MVYLI's program leads to more motivated students; increased support from Islanders and seasonal residents; MVYLI College Field Trips hosts, scholarships, internships and summer jobs. Supporters and sponsors are invited with mentors to Community Recognition Events.

#### **Benefits to the Vineyard Community**

- Exposes young minds to inspiring leaders, opens doors and expands their horizons.
- Helps translate youth passion with practical experience in the job market and the world of work.
- Our goal is to give youth a **positive experience of the world of work, promote a good work ethic**, and develop long-lasting relationships that contribute to the island and global economy.
- **Better trained workforce:** MVYLI provides training that prepares young people to contribute to the Island's workforce. **The YMCA of MV** has hired several MVYLI youth for their summer camps and afternoon programs. MVYLI youth serve as interns at **Martha's Vineyard Community Television** documenting town meetings and sports events for the Island community to view.
- **Develop New Leadership**: The Vineyard has so many wonderful leaders on the island who have over the years directed its future. There is general agreement that now is the time to groom a new generation of leaders that will ensure the Island's future for generations to come. The Martha's Vineyard Commission has expressed the need for young people to be involved with the Island Plan 2050.
- Youth receive educational tools and training to prepare them to address key issues and develop projects.
- Youth receive tools to make healthy decisions/choices and build on their strengths, minimize their weaknesses;

#### MVYLI Job Shadow Day

MVYLI's mission is to train young people to become leaders in their lives, their community and the world. MVYLI is a project of the **Stone Soup Leadership Institute**, a 501c3 non-profit organization founded in 1997 on Martha's Vineyard. The Institute hosts the **Cronkite Awards Ceremony** to benefit MVYLI. For over a decade, Mr. Cronkite was the Institute's honorary chairperson. MVYLI's year round programs include Youth Leadership Summit for Sustainable Development, College Prep, Field Trip & Scholarship Program, Career Mentoring Program (Job Shadow Day) and Special Projects. MVYLI youth served as representatives to the Governor's Statewide Youth Council: 2010-2015. All Vineyard youth (14-21 years) are able to the attend programs at no charge. MVYLI partners with national organizations:

The **National Groundhog Job Shadow Day,** a national campaign gives young people a new perspective on their studies through hands-on learning and a one-day mentoring experience. Nationwide, more than one million students and 100,000 businesses participate, 2,000 restaurants and hotels hosted nearly 20,000 students.

During the last four years, MVYLI has matched over 60 Island businesses and professionals with Vineyard youth. This one-day experience has been eye opening and even life changing.

**Julia Cooper** was curious about the world of sustainable architecture. MVYLI matched her with **Ryan Bushey** at the **South Mountain Company.** This one afternoon helped Julia to see that she really wanted a more people-oriented career. For the next year Julia explored the life of a college professor with **John Kennedy** from LaSalle University of Philadelphia. Julia is now pursuing this career at **Colgate University.** 

**Jacob Lawrence** first shadowed Brian Billsback at PwC (PricewaterhouseCoopers) in Boston. Then after serving as MC for MVYLI's Multicultural Assembly at MVRHS, he wanted to explore the world of public relations. Jacob shadowed then **Senator John Kerry's Communications Director,** Nicole Caravella who worked in both the public and private sectors. "The day was one that I will remember for a long time," says Jacob. By discovering his passion before applying to colleges, Jacob focused his application process. He credits MVYLI's Job Shadow Day with saving he (and his parents) thousands of dollars!

Maisie Jarrell is exploring her options for before applying to colleges next year. She has a wide range of interests – from medicine to the Peace Corps. She is also curious about the world of event planning. For her first mentoring experience she wants to explore the world of event planning. Megan Honey, Special Events Manager at **The Harbor View Hotel** will mentor Maisie. As part of her learning process, Maisie will assist with the coordination of **MVYLI Advisory Council's** November meeting with Island leaders. One of the highlights is a skype video session with MVYLI Alumni Isabella El-Diery, a sophomore at Howard University.

**Benjamin Nadelstein** is a sophomore at MVRHS who aspires to become a media producer. MVYLI is developing a personalized plan for Ben with a wide range of mentors including musical professor and recording producer, **Ed Merck**, music recording business technology developer, **Norman Hall**, video production studio with **MVRHS Librarian Kevin McGrath and MVTV**. Ben is developing a Job Shadow Day video featuring MVYLI youth and their mentors. MVYLI will feature this on its website, Facebook page, YouTube education channel and on MVTV to inspire more youth and members of the Vineyard community to share their time, talents and resources with our youth. This video will be a tremendous asset to Ben's portfolio so he can share with college admissions directors and potential employers.

MVYLI College Youth are matched with strategically significant professionals. Isabella El-Deiry was first matched with international human rights activist and author, Rose Styron, then TV journalist and civil rights leader Charlayne Hunter-Gault. She is now an intern with Bob Schieffer at CBS' Face the Nation while pursuing her college studies at Howard University in Washington D.C. Lucy Norris, a freshman at St. Louis University in Madrid is matched with business leader David Brush in Spain.



Dr. Mark Hahn, Ph.D. Chairman, Biology Department Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution

Dr. Mark Hahn is Senior Scientist and Chairman of the Biology Department at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. In 1987 he joined WHOI as Postdoctoral Fellow and worked there ever since. In addition, Dr. Hahn taught at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (1992-2008).

The goal at the Hahn Lab at WHOI is to understand the biochemical and molecular mechanisms that underlie the interactions of animals with their chemical environment. They examine these mechanisms from comparative and evolutionary perspectives to understand the fundamental features of the biochemical systems that control the response of animals to toxic chemicals.

Dr. Hahn and his group have begun investigating NRF2-mediated responses to oxidative stress in the zebrafish embryo model and the role of microRNAs in developmental toxicology. Mark's research includes Comparative biochemistry and molecular mechanisms of chemical-biological interactions in aquatic animals; receptor-mediated mechanisms of gene regulation and toxicity; mechanisms of adaptation and acquired resistance; aquatic animal models in toxicology; molecular evolution of transcription factors involved in environmental sensing; mechanisms of response to oxidative stress; biological effects of marine natural products; comparative genomics; role of microRNAs in developmental toxicity.

In 1988 he received his Ph.D. and M.S. of Toxicology at University of Rochester School of Medicine, Rochester, NY. In 1980 he graduated from Harpur College, State University of New York at Binghamton with a B.S. of Biological Sciences.

Dr. Hahn serves or has served on editorial boards of several journals: *Toxicological Sciences* (Associate Editor), *Aquatic Toxicology* (Associate Editor), *Chemico-Biological Interactions, and Environmental Toxicology and Chemistry*. He served as Director of the Pilot Project Program for the Woods Hole Center for Oceans and Human Health. Previously, he served as Chair of the Joint Committee on Biological Oceanography of the WHOI/Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Joint Graduate Program in Oceanography and Oceanographic Engineering. Dr. Hahn is author or co-author of over 100 papers in peer-reviewed journals.

### **Importance of Representation By Lila Norris**

As a young woman – and with this year's election -- a movie about strong women, was just what we needed. This past week, the Martha's Vineyard Film Center in Vineyard Haven offered a showing of Queen of Katwe, free to all Vineyard youth. The movie stars Madina Nalwanga as Phiona, a young Ugandan girl who masters the game of chess, and uses her skill to escape poverty.

Queen of Katwe is especially noteworthy as a Disney movie, starring a young woman in distress who doesn't have any romantic interests. This is a great example of Disney following in the footsteps of many large companies working to empower young women.

Throughout the movie, Phiona's mother Nakku played by Lupita Nyong'o continuously refuses romantic advances, and chooses to raise her four children as a single mother, something nearly unheard of in rural Uganda. While this comes with its challenges, Nakku holds her head high, and always finds a way to persevere.

The importance of representing strong women in the media is something that is often unfortunately underestimated. Today, more and more young girls are striving to realize their potential, whether it be academically, artistically, athletically, or things that may seem as small as a game of chess. The fact is, girls are drastically shaking the phrase "it's a man's world".

A study done at the University of Pennsylvania by senior data scientist Dr. Randy Olson showed that the percent of women receiving degrees in majors largely considered male-dominant professions, such as engineering and agriculture has radically increased in the last forty years.

The most important thing that we as a society can do, is continue to nurture the "anything-is-possible" mentality in young girls. In my opinion there is no better way than through movies and books telling the story of strong young girls just like Phiona.

This past week, many island youth took advantage of the opportunity to see Queen of Katwe. Many were positively affected including Martha's Vineyard Youth Leadership Initiative senior Camilla Prata who said the movie was "Very inspiring" and that "Through determination and hard work [Phiona] was able to push through and overcome obstacles in order to achieve her goal." A huge thank you to the Martha's Vineyard Film Center for this great opportunity to be inspired by an amazing story.

Philippine's Foundation for Education Economic Development developed strategic alliances between business, government, media and community leaders to support their nation rebuilding efforts after People Power; trained with NGO leader Marietta Goco in microfinance. Mrs. Goco received the Institute's Eleanor Roosevelt Award. The Franklin & Eleanor Roosevelt Institute supported Ms. Larned to document the Award's impact on Mrs. Goco to build a national coalition to restructure the Philippines Constitution to provide representation of indigenous leaders.
